How can institutions best organize their ETDs for collection management purposes that also lead to sound preservation strategies?

The NDLTD collaborates with the MetaArchive Cooperative to provide an ETD-specific Distributed Digital Preservation Network (DDPN). The 10 June 2009 workshop will provide anyone in the ETD community an opportunity to acquire the information necessary to join the preservation network, confidently store their ETDs in the Dark Archive for fail-safe retrieval.

The NDLTD DDPN is part of the MetaArchive Cooperative's preservation archives (<http://www.metaarchive.org/>), which employ modified open-source LOCKSS software (<http://www.lockss.org/>) to harvest, cache, and validate files programmatically among the geographically dispersed members of the NDLTD. The MetaArchive Cooperative is an independent, international membership association comprised of institutions that seek an active role in the preservation of their digital collections.
