# I THOUGHT I COULD FLY

The photographic exhibition *I* Thought I Could Fly was displayed on the first floor of the Millstein Library from Sept. 7 through Oct. 14. The exhibit was sponsored by the Friends of the Millstein Library.

I Thought I Could Fly is a traveling exhibition organized by the American Jewish Museum (AJM), showcasing work by acclaimed photographer Charlee Brodsky. *I Thought I Could Fly* pairs Brodsky's photographs with personal narratives by individuals whose lives are affected in some way by mental illness. Brodsky's black and white photos portray metaphorical images based on the narratives to capture the essence of each experience. Throughout the exhibit, photos and text work together to destigmatize mental illness. An intriguing supplement to the exhibition is a 13-minute documentary film based on *I Thought I Could Fly*. The film integrates Brodsky's photographs with interviews of people whose narratives are included in the exhibit, bringing their personal experiences to life. 


#### MEET THE STUDENT WORKERS

#### FEATURED MOVIES IN THE LIBRARY

One of the most criticallyacclaimed science fiction movies in recent years, *District* 9 is now available on DVD in the Millstein Library. The film was nominated for four Academy Awards in 2010, including Best Editing, Best Visual Effects, Best Adapted Screenplay, and Best Picture. District 9, which features a mostly unknown cast, opens and closes with documentarystyle footage, giving the story a more authentic feel. The lead character, Wikus Van De Merwe, is played by Sharlto Copley in his first film role. The metaphorical and actionpacked plot follows a group of aliens stranded in poverty in South Africa, and the group of humans led by Wikus trying to evict them to a new camp. Wikus becomes infected with an alien substance and learns firsthand what it's like to be an alien. The excellent CGI special effects also add to the film's realism.
